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West Bay Harbour



*Strong connections to the harbour make West Bay a truly livable neighbourhood and a popular destination for locals and visitors. Looking out over the harbour from the West Bay Walkway or Captain Jacobson Park it's clear that the West Bay harbour is a distinct place. A place shaped in part by the natural and human history that relate to the harbour. This edition of the **WBRA Update** focuses on the West Bay harbour, its waterfront ecology, colourful history, interesting places and the special people who choose to live there.*

Esquimalt's West Bay neighbourhood was formed by significant periods in its history. These periods lie at the heart of its local vibe and distinctive sense of place that make it a favourite destination for locals and visitors alike.

"You will see ancient shorelines, intriguing trails,

Garry oak forests, incredible glimpses into our maritime and military past, heritage homes designed by renowned architects, and coastal and upland parks that are the envy of the region." (Township of Esquimalt Walking Tour #1 West Bay.)

For 4,000 years the Lək'wəḡən People (Esquimalt and Songhees Nations) harvested shellfish and had fishing camps on the shores of West Bay. Work Point Barracks, established in 1887, is one of the oldest landmarks in Esquimalt. Many unique heritage homes, some designed by well known architects, bring a rich historical character to the neighbourhood. The numerous small

wartime homes in West Bay were built to house labourers for Work Point installations and shipyard workers brought in to build ships for the war effort. The West Bay Walkway is part of a regionally significant linear park that brings you to the Matson Lands, home to Victoria harbour's last patch of rare and endangered Garry oak ecosystems that lies within the first migratory bird sanctuary established in Pacific Canada.



The West Bay basin is not only Esquimalt's gateway to the Victoria harbour, it also provides a safe haven for mariners, and offers opportunities for a wide array of water-based activities and commercial enterprises. There are three marinas in the West Bay basin: Sailor's Cove at the entrance to the West Bay Walkway, Hidden Harbour Marine Centre in front of Captain Jacobson Park, and West Bay Marina next to the Salish Seaside RV Haven.

West Bay is also home to our nautical neighbours, residents aka 'floaties' who choose to live on the water.

Whether you live on a float home, a house boat, or live aboard a sail or power boat, your dwelling will rise and fall with the tide, and rock and roll at times due to inclement weather. All of these floating abodes come in a variety of shapes and sizes with varying levels of comforts and conveniences that most upland residents tend to take for granted

In this edition you'll get a glimpse into what it means to live on the water, and meet some of the diverse group of people who make that choice. There is no doubt that the 'floatie' lifestyle adds to the distinct visual and social fabric of West Bay.



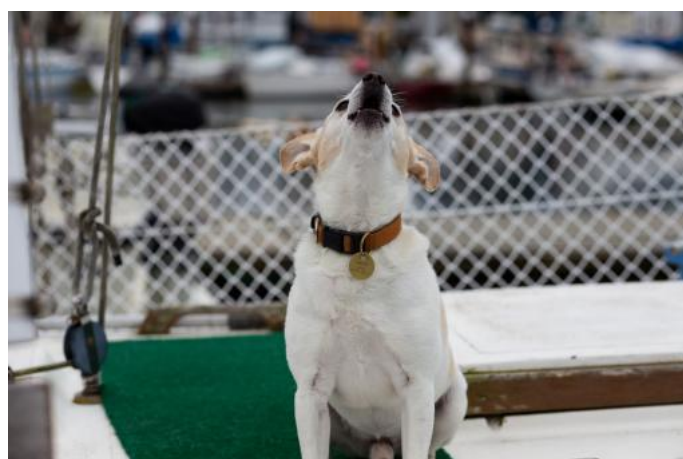

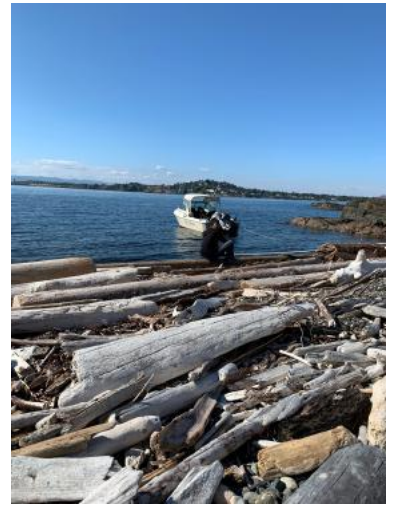

Waterfront Ecology and Ecosystems in West Bay



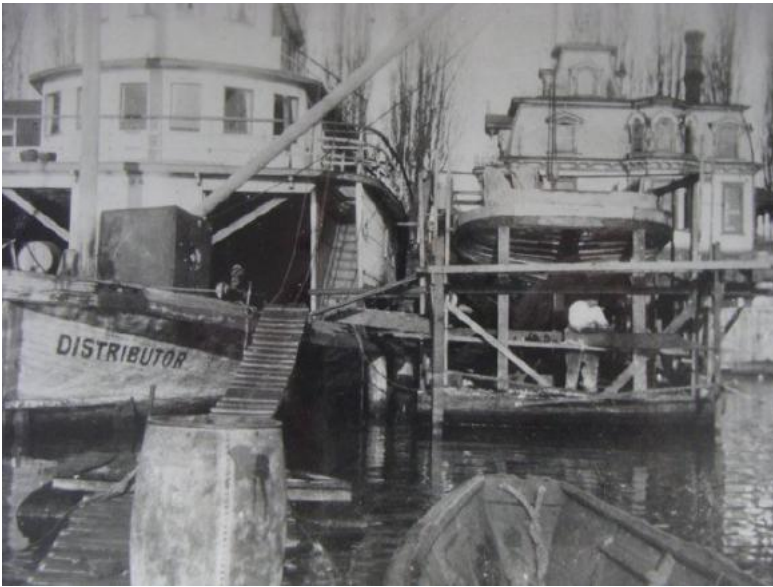
Victoria Migratory Bird Sanctuary - Several marine bird species call West Bay home - The migratory bird sanctuary was established by the Government of Canada, October 27, 1923, making it the oldest Migratory Bird Sanctuary (MBS) in Pacific Canada.

Matson Conservation Lands - Head down the West Bay Walkway and you will find this precious protected place nestled at the water's edge. This last Garry oak meadow on Victoria's Inner Harbour also falls within the Migratory Bird Sanctuary.





Purple Martin Houses - Even some purple martins have their homes on the water in West Bay.

West Bay Walkway -The West Bay Walkway is a walking path and boardwalk that connects Esquimalt (from Head Street at Sailor's Cove Marina) to downtown Victoria (Johnston Street Bridge). It was built as a joint project with the Provincial Capital Commission and the City of Victoria. The pathway is approximately 5 km and connects with Victoria's Westsong Walkway.



Is it a float-home, a house-boat or just a boat?



Float Home - A float home is built on floats and is stationary. Having no propulsion of its own, it requires assistance to move it.

House Boat - A house boat is a vessel typically built on a hull of sorts. While it does have its own means of propulsion, it is not particularly seaworthy and rarely leaves the dock.



Boats - Sail and power boats that people call home are referred to as live-a-board vessels. They offer varying levels of sea-worthiness, with some being capable enough to sail around the world.
